A Conversation with Gary Shelton Relief Operator for Greenville Utilities Commission

Gary Shelton says he is like most other water plant operators around the state of North Carolina; out looking for a full time job and getting hired as a water plant operator. That's exactly what happened to him back in November 1988 in the City of Wilson.

"I didn't know the difference between pH and turbidity back then, but I quickly learned," Shelton says. "I got tired of getting laid off. I had a chance at a couple of jobs and this job paid the least, but I wanted job security with some kind of state retirement."

Shelton says the City of Wilson had a water plant operator job posting at the Employment Security Commission and he applied because he felt it would offer the job security he wanted. He stayed in Wilson until June 2000 and decided to take a job opening at Greenville Utilities Commission (GUC). Shelton has been there for 17 years and is in the short rows to retirement with only three years to go. He says he is a "Jack of all trades" helping to run the operations at GUC, a water treatment plant at 21½ mgd and interconnects with Bethel, Farmville, and Winterville.

"Three of us oversee three operators making sure the water is as it should be and everybody is where they are supposed to be," he says about his day-to-day operations. "If anybody is out, we cover for them. We are also in charge of monthly reports and making sure they are correct and we look after remote sites. We have two elevated tanks which we check once a week."

Shelton has certifications in A Surface, A Well, C Distribution, and Class I Maintenance Tech. In 2004, he was voted as Operator of the Year for the North Carolina Waterworks Operators Association (NCWOA). He says NCWOA has been helpful for him and his career because it is such a hands-on organization.

"I am a hands on kind of guy and it gives me those opportunities," he says. "You can get out into other plants and really see how things work."

With retirement just three short years away Shelton has some plans in place, one of which will include, he hopes, staying in the water industry as a part-timer. He says he will continue to ride his Harley Davidson motorcycle, keep target shooting, and attend as many tractor pulls and drag races he can. He is also toying with the idea of going to school to become a gunsmith.

"I do minor stuff now, but I want to get into the machine side of it," he says. "It takes a lifetime to become a true gunsmith."

He says his family owns a farm and after retirement that is where most of his days will be spent, enjoying the peace that is there and the Contentnea Creek that runs out back.

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Operator's Spotlight

A Conversation with Neil Carpenter Leaving a Legacy

Neil Carpenter is the District Manager of the Maggie Valley Sanitary District (MVSD) and a lifelong resident of Haywood County in Western North Carolina. Maggie Valley lies in the northwest corner of the county just south of the Cataloochee Ski area and close to the Cherokee Indian Reservation. Maggie Valley is home to the famous, Stomping Grounds and The Wheels Through Time Museum which has over 300 rare vintage motorcycles and the former home of Ghost Town in the Sky, which makes for a visitor friendly area. The District has 3800 meters serving approximately 9300 people.

Neil has worked at the MVSD for 27 years, starting out in 1990 as an operator trainee at the (then) 1.5 MGD surface water treatment plant and as a distribution system operator. He quickly rose through the ranks and received his A-Surface license as a water treatment operator in the minimum time frame. Today, as the manager, he works alongside 6 operators and 3 office personnel. The entire staff acts as if they are all one big happy family, wherein everyone is friendly and helpful (not only to their customers), but to whomever may enter their door. That is a common trait of the people of Haywood County.

In the late 90's, the former manager Tom Whittle decided to step down and recommended that the district's board appoint Neil as the new manager. At the time, the board was considering major projects to upgrade and expand the water treatment plant to 3.0 MGD and to rehabilitate all the main trunk lines in the distribution system. Of course, the board felt Neil was the man for the job and Tom stayed on to assist in whatever way he was needed.

Unfortunately, not long after Neil became the manager, the business office and main parts storage building was burned almost to the ground by a fire caused by lightning during a horrific summer storm. Neil and his staff worked diligently to recover all the district's historical records, much needed equipment, and parts not totally damaged in the fire. That event set off a firestorm of improvements at Maggie Valley, which now has a new modern office complex, new water treatment plant, and successful replacement of all the main transmission lines in the distribution system.

Another important need arose and the district installed a state of the art SCADA system to monitor and operate the many booster pumping stations and water storage tanks throughout this very mountainous terrain. Before the SCADA system was installed, the operators would have to drive sometimes twice per day to check on pump operations and water tank levels. When water main breaks occurred, one or even two operators would spend most of the day running back and forth up the mountain checking to see what stations were operating. Sometimes, just getting

to those stations was a daunting task, especially during severe weather events or during one of the frequent winter snow storm events. Today, the operator on duty can simply click the mouse on 10 booster pumping stations and 12 water tank sites and immediately know what the status is.


When Neil took over the system there were other long neglected problems and one of those was water loss due to



leakage or water not being accounted for. The rate was a staggering 57% of water produced per day. After years of repairing leaks, replacing mains, and installing new meters, the District now has a loss water rate of 16%. Pretty good for a water system that next year will be 50 years old.

Neil has also been very active with the NC Rural Water Association and with NCWOA. He served as President of NCRWA from 2013-2015 and is now the association's Treasurer. He and his staff are active with NCWOA, having hosted many training and section meetings over the years. All of the staff are both members of NCRWA and NCWOA. In 2000, Neil was recognized with the J.A. Younts Award from the NCRWA and the Maggie Valley WTP and staff have received several AWOP awards from the NC DEQ for meeting excellent turbidity and microbial removal at their plant.

When asked what was on his "bucket list," he quickly began talking about the district's, Balsam Range Legacy Project or simply called, the Forest Legacy Project. This project is a joint effort by the MVSD and the NC Land Conservancy Group to place all of the Campbell's Creek Watershed in

protected trust and conservancy. As of this writing, 6,109 acres have been preserved with some 455 acres under research or in acquisition efforts. This watershed extends from the base of Maggie Valley to the ridgeline which meets the Blue Ridge Parkway to the south along what is called the Balsam Range of Haywood County. Campbell's

They truly enjoy family and friends and as you would expect, they have never seen a stranger as they say in the mountains. Neil enjoys fly fishing and deer hunting and an occasional round of golf. He does aspire to travel out west and to do some hunting and fishing there in the

Field to Lab to Process Testing for Chlorine and Turbidity

This workshop is designed to teach proper analytical techniques for systems using chlorine for disinfection. Analytical technologies covered in the workshop will be colorimetry analysis for chlorine using the Pocket Colorimeter II, DR900 colorimeter, and DR1900 spectrophotometer for field and lab testing; and CL17 and CL110 for process testing. Technology covered for turbidity will be 2100Q, TL23, and TU5200 for lab analysis, and 1720E and TU5400 for process testing.

Test parameters analyzed will be free chlorine, total chlorine, and turbidity. An ultra-low range chlorine procedure will be demonstrated with a DR1900 and a pour-thru cell. The course objectives will be met by presenting test theory, incorporating practical applications of analytical techniques with "hands-on" experience with test systems. Students are required to analyze water samples of known and unknown values. Attendees have the option to bring their own instrument to class.

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
